Abstract (max 500 words)	<p>The Australian Health Sector Emergency Response Plan for Novel Coronavirus (COVID- 19) was activated on 27 February 2020, in response to the evolving global crisis. The national COVID-19 primary care response was then initiated.</p> <p>Australia's primary care response to COVID-19 acknowledged the strength of the nation's primary healthcare system and assigned key roles to general practice and the wider primary healthcare sector in responding to the pandemic, based on the essential first contact role of primary care and lessons drawn from previous epidemics and pandemics. It also placed general practice expertise within the national planning and decision-making processes alongside expertise in public health, infectious diseases, epidemiology, nursing, and mental health.</p> <p>Australia's national COVID-19 primary care response is based on a set of principles, which form a framework for managing both the current crisis and for future national and international responses to health emergencies, building on the contributions of general practice and primary care in the:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Protection of vulnerable people.2. Provision of treatment and support services to affected people.3. Continuity of regular healthcare services for the whole population.4. Protection and support of primary healthcare workers and primary care services.5. Provision of mental health services to the community and the primary healthcare workforce.
